

### The Duvall Family

The Duvall family of Edmonson County seems to have come from Pennsylvania. I have not done any research on the line before 1850, but the progenitors of the clan appeared on the census of Edmonson County, 1850:

Jacob Duvall	73, born in Penn.
Elizabeth	68, born in Penn.

We don't know when Jacob and Elizabeth came to Kentucky, where they married, or when they were married. Three of their children married into the Elisha French family, and we know of but four of their children.

Gabriel, son of Jacob Duvall and Elizabeth Ricket, was married to Ellen, daughter of Elisha French and either Jane Norris or Mary Payne, May 25, 1842.

Thomas, born in Nelson County, son of Jacob Duvall and Elizabeth Ricket, was married to Elizabeth, daughter of Elisha French and Jane Norris, September 1, 1843.

Priscilla, daughter of Jacob Duvall and Elizabeth Ricket, was married to Robert, son of Elisha French and Jane Norris, October 9, 1843.

These three marriages were found in the marriage records of St. Joseph in Leitchfield, and in the Edmonson County Courthouse. Robert French and Priscilla apparently moved to Illinois with Elisha circa 1852.

Gabriel and Ellen moved to Jasper County, Illinois after 1850, where they both died. Thomas, Gabriel's brother, went to Illinois and brought the children back to Kentucky to live with him and his family. There is a story in the Duvall and Lashley family that tells of Thomas also bringing Rosanna Jones Lashley Goodman back to Kentucky after ransoming her with either gold or silver. Rosanna was married to James Lashley, progenitor of the Sunfish Lashleys, in Edmonson County May 31, 1827. After James died, she was married to John William Goodman March 3, 1863.

This is another son of Jacob Duvall and Elizabeth Ricket. Elizabeth, who was 68 on the 1850 census, should be 88 on this census, but the census takers did not do a very good job in recording names and ages.

I have not researched this entire family, and will limit myself to the Duvall families who lived in Sunfish.

Two of the children of Jacob M. and Pattie were not on this census. Vitruely, daughter of Jacob M. Duvall and Pattie Jones, was married to James Elisha, son of Christopher C. Durbin and Elizabeth Lahsley, January 19, 1890. Truly Durbin, above, was a daughter of James Elisha and Vitruely. (This line will be carried in the Christopher Durbin, Jr. Family Section.)

The other child not on the 1900 census was Idonia.

In the Cemetery of St. John, Sunfish:

According to the birth records, Jake Duvall and Nancy Durbin had no more children. According to Bennie Duvall, they lived down the road that runs east from the Little Mountain. There used to be a school on that road.

In deed book #35, page 124, Edmonson County, Jacob T. Duvall and Nancy, his wife, sold two tracts of land to S.E. Duvall (his brother) on December 13, 1930 for \$535.00.

There is no will or other document to indicate when Jacob T. died, but it must have been close to 1930. Bennie Duvall told me that after Jacob died, Nancy left Sunfish to live with one of her children, but Bennie didn't know where.

There is a mistake in this census. James T. should be 14, born in 1896. Wavy E., born in 1898, should be 12. Since he was not on the census, and since there was another child named Wavy Edward, born in 1904, was assume the first Wavy had died.

James Soloman Duvall, born in 1870, died November 15, 1918. Sarah Malinda Duvall, born in 1872, died in 1959.

1. Caldonia, daughter of James S. Duvall and Sarah M. Durbin, was married to John Marcus, son of Charles Lashley and Jemima Musick, April 15, 1909. (This line will be carried in the Lashley Family Section.)

When Martin Joseph Durbin moved his family to Graves County in 1908, he sold his farm to James S. Duvall. The farm was either given or sold to John Lashley and Caldonia when they married. The house sits on the south side of the road just west of the first big dip going from Sunfish to Bee Spring. The farm is still owned by the heirs of John and Caldonia.

In 1984 I talked to Sister Paul Joseph, daughter of Martin Joseph Durbin, and she told me about visiting her old home. She was only two years old when her family moved, but she got a real thrill seeing her father's farm.

2. Elisha T., son of James S. Duvall and Sarah M. Durbin, was married to Maggie, daughter of Thomas Lashley and Nancy Jane Duvall, October 8, 1913.

Elisha and Maggie lived on a road running south from the Sunfish-Bee Spring Road, shown as the Duvall Cemetery Road on County maps.

e. Nannie, daughter of Elisha T. Duvall and Maggie Lashley, born July 28, 1926, was married to Harold Thomas of Marion County, in Louisville, August 20, 1949.

Harold and Nannie had no children, but did adopt two boys. They now live at 4612 Rutland Avenue, Louisville, Kentucky 40215.

f. Sherman, son of Elisha T. Duvall and Maggie Lashley, born November 27, 1934, was married to Betty Seabolt.

g. Gertrude, daughter of Elisha T. Duvall and Maggie Lashley, born November 27, 1934, died May 25, 1949 from leukemia.

h. Senate, son of Elisha T. Duvall and Maggie Lashley, born \_\_\_\_\_, was married to Linda Rose, daughter of Lindell Grant and Francis Marie White, July 25, 1959.

3. James T., son of James S. Duvall and Sarah Malinda Durbin, was married to Bennie, daughter of William Woosley and Eliza Bush, February 17, 1917.

James T. and Bennie, and their family, could well fill one book. There isn't much J.T. hasn't done, and his children, with their service in the U.S. military and their jobs and families, could take volumes. I will try to limit myself to the pertinent facts.

J.T. and Bennie moved to a farm at Cub Creek, February 19, 1917, stayed one year, and then J.T. and his father bought the store which was located just north of Sunfish Creek from Thomas Durbin. They went broke in 1929 (that is when my father and Kit Logsdon bought the store), and J.T. went to Detroit looking for a job, leaving Bennie and the children in Sunfish.

There was no work to be found in Detroit, so J.T. went to Indianapolis and found work sorting mail for the Post Office. After about nine months he tired of sorting mail, and went to work for the streetcar line. He and Bennie returned to the Cub Creek farm in 1932.

In 1936, J.T. moved the family to Lebanon Junction, and after the 1937 flood, which completely surrounded Lebanon Junction, moved back to Cub Creek. J.T.'s brother, Wavy, had gone to Louisville in the early 1940's, and J.T. bought Wavy's farm at the Little Mountain. He then bought the store at South, Kentucky, and leased the store of J.L. Durbin. He learned that Louis Durbin and Edgar Hack, who had bought the store from my father in Sunfish, were anxious to sell out, and he traded the place at Little Mountain to Edgar Hack for the new house he had just built beside Sunfish Creek, and bought the Sunfish Mercantile Co.

In 1949, J.T. started selling Ferguson tractors and farm implements at Leitchfield, and started the Buick agency there in 1950. J.T. was only the third dealer handling Ferguson tractors

in Kentucky, in opposition to the Ford tractor, which was made on the Ferguson patent. Apparently he did well, for he retired in 1965 after buying approximately 300 acres of some of the best farm land in Sunfish. He turned the Buick agency over to his youngest son, Pius.

James T. and Bennie were the parents of fourteen children:

- a. Curtis, born November 29, 1917, was married to Alberta Bowman of Lebanon Junction. He served for seven years in the Navy during World War II, rising to the rank of Chief Petty Officer. After the Navy, he started working for the Seaboard Railroad Line, and now lives in Florida.
- b. Julia, born July 13, 1919, was married to Rube Luttrell of Brownsville. Julia is a hair dresser.
- c. Rosalie, born April 30, 1920, was married to Albert Gaddis, Army Air Force. Albert was born March 6, 1919, died March 24, 1965, buried at St. John, Sunfish. Rosalie now lives in Louisville.
- d. Mary Evelyn, born September 8, 1922, entered the convent of the Ursuline Sisters at Mount St. Joseph in Daviess County.
- e. Mary E., born December 13, 1923, died February 8, 1935 in a fire.
- f. Mary Frances, born February 9, 1925, was married to Charles Heath. They now live in Farmington, New Mexico.
- g. Lawrence, born October 5, 1926, served for twenty years in the Navy, retiring as Chief Petty Officer. He was married to Margaret Crawford of Louisville.
- h. Catherine, born April 30, 1928, entered the convent of the Home Missioners, Glenmary, of Cincinnati, Ohio. She left the convent after a few years, and is now the administrator of the Mountain Home nursing home in North Carolina. She has never married.
- i. Joseph A., born January 2, 1930, served for twenty years in the Navy, retiring as Chief Petty Officer. He was married to Jean Taylor of South Carolina, and after discharge moved to

Vine Grove. Joe was a barber in the Navy and, I believe, continued working as a barber at Fort Knox. He died from cancer December 22, 1984.

- j. Theresa Marie, born October 30, 1932, was married to Joseph Cruciani. Theresa died September 20, 1956 while undergoing an operation.
- k. Paul, born and died October 25, 1933.
- l. Mary Elizabeth, born October 11, 1934, was married to James Davis of Leitchfield.
- m. Martha Ann, born November 6, 1936, was married first to James Melvin, son of James French and Alma Hayes. (This line will be carried in the French Family Section.)
- n. William Pius, born June 24, 1938, was married to Carolyn Decker. He ran the Buick agency in Leitchfield for 19 years. He and Carolyn were divorced, and he now lives in Sunfish, next to his parents.

J.T. and Bennie also adopted an orphan girl, Elizabeth Shain, born November 20, 1908, in 1918. Elizabeth's parents died from tuberculosis.

- 4. Mary Ellen, daughter of James S. Duvall and Sarah Malinda Durbin, was married to James Ebon, son of George Washington Hayes and Susan Durbin, July 7, 1917. (This line will be carried in the Hayes Family Section.)
- 5. Ova Oscar, son of James S. Duvall and Sarah Malinda Durbin, was married to Ethel, daughter of Andrew Jackson Tomes and Mary Belle Bush, April 18, 1922.

Ova and Ethel lived for many years on the Duvall Cemetery Road which runs south from the Sunfish-Bee Spring Road. After the children left home, they bought some property on the main road and built themselves a fine home.

Ova was elected as magistrate for the Sunfish area, and retained the position for several years. I think he found the prestige of this office to his liking, for he was proud of his

accomplishments. He and Ethel worked very hard for their material possessions, and while not great, for this time and age, they were considered to be "well off".

a. James Norman, born February 22, 1923, was in the Navy during World War II. The Navy discovered he had tuberculosis, and he spent several months in a hospital before being discharged. He took training in watch repair, and worked at that trade for a while after he came back to Sunfish.

Norman was married to Hallie, daughter of George Heath and Essie DeWeese, January 12, 1946.

Norman and Hallie were the parents of three children:

cc. Marsha Lou, born December 18, 1950, died January 14, 1978.

Marsha Lou became sick with some childhood disease while quite small, developed an extremely high fever, and slipped into a coma. She never regained consciousness. Hallie tended to all her needs, and the last time I can remember seeing her, she looked like an angel lying there in her bed.

b. Leonard, born February 6, 19\_\_, was married to Delphia Meredith, parentage unknown, December 13, 1947.

Leonard worked for the Kelley Bee Hive factory in Leitchfield for many years, but eventually went into farming full time.

Leonard and Delphia were the parents of two sons:

aa. Jackie Lynn, born \_\_\_\_\_, was married to Lois Ann Stinnett of Grayson County.

bb. Joey Glenn, born December 18, 1950, was married to Vickie Joyce Dennis of Leitchfield, Grayson County.

- c. Andrew Kermit, born October 28, 1932, was married to Mary Magdalin, daughter of Ralph Davis and Minnie Barnes, of Leitchfield, in Grayson County, June 2, 1951.

Kermit worked for the Ford Motor Company for many years, but left there to work for Chevron Oil, where he has worked for the past 23 years. Mary worked for Dairyman's Milk Co. for 27 years, before she retired in 1985.

Kermit and Mary were the parents of two sons:

- aa. James Phillip, born February 28, 1952, was married to Luann Cecil.

- bb. Patrick Allen, born October 17, 1953, was married to Cynthia Darlene Gentry.

- d. Christina, born June 19, 1942, was married to Terry Ray, son of John Raymond Durbin and Sarah Elizabeth Durbin, July 29, 1961. (This line will be carried in the Williard Richard Durbin Family Section.)

6. Wavy Edward, son of James S. Duvall and Sarah Malinda Durbin, was married to Ethel Ann, daughter of James P. Simon and Mary Frances French, April 28, 1922.

Wavy and Ethel lived on a small farm on Highway #157 at the north end of Sunfish, close to Little Mountain, and their children attended the one-room school house at Little Mountaon. I believe there were four fields to the farm, and the one thing I remember best is the concord grape arbor that was at the back of their house. The grapes grew on a long and wide trellis, and when the grapes were getting ripe, we kids and the birds made short work of them.

Wavy moved the family to Louisville shortly after World War II started, and the family lived in the federal housing project at 13th and Hill Streets. Wavy eventually started operting the Gulf Service Station on the northeast corner of Preston and Oak Streets. J.S. worked with him, and it wasn't long before he was able to buy a house on Taylor Boulevard.



The older children worked in defense plants, except for J.S., and things went well, especially after the hard life they knew in Sunfish.

Wavy took over the management of a Texaco service station at Radcliff, Kentucky, but continued to live on Taylor Boulevard in Louisville. After some years he bought a mobile home, and he and Ethel lived in Radcliff.

After the children were grown and away from home, Wavy and Ethel were divorced. Wavy was remarried, but I never found out the second wife's name.

Wavy Edward was born February 25, 1904, died March 7, 1969.  
Ethel Ann Simon Duvall was born December 7, 1902, died \_\_\_\_\_.

After some of the children moved to Florida, at New Port Ritchie, Ethel moved in with her daughter, Joann, and her second husband.

#### **Children of Wavy Edward Duvall and Ethel Ann Simon**

- a. James Herman, born April 20, 1923, was married to Helen Fay Reese of Louisville, March 3, 1946. There were no children.

After Helen's death, Herman continued to work in Louisville until he retired, and then moved to Florida. He was married there to \_\_\_\_\_, and they now live near Fort Myers.

- b. Frances Geneva, born October 7, 1924, was married to George Garrett of Louisville, March 17, 1946.

George served in the Navy during World War II, and when he was discharged, he and Geneva were married. He worked in a service station at Radcliff for a few months, and then worked one on his own. He got into trucking, and moved to New Port Ritchie, where he took over the business of his brother-in-law when it became obvious the in-law was going to lose it. He continues to run the heavy equipment firm, but because of serious heart problems has had to cut back on his hours.

George and Geneva were the parents of three children:

- c. Laymon Edward, born March 17, 1926, was married to Mary Juanita Blackwell of Louisville, July 14, 1945. Laymon was 19 years old, Mary was 17 years old, and they had known each other but six weeks when they married.

Laymon worked at Consolidated Aircraft during World War II, making B-24s for the British. The American version of the B-24 had two rudders, while the British version had only one. He was on a flight crew which tested the airplanes, and his job was to test the machineguns.

Laymon took the Charles Atlas body building course while he was still a young man, and he developed muscles on top of muscles. He was always a big, strong man, and his muscles sometimes got him into trouble, for he would take nothing off anyone, even his boss.

Laymon and Mary were the parents of five children:

- aa. Michael Edward, born March 30, 1947, was married to Cathy Trotter. Mike now weighs 325 pounds and is a par golfer.
- bb. John Randell, born March 12, 1949, was married to Kay Yunt. Randy is employed by the Jefferson County Sheriff.
- cc. Patricia Gale, born November 14, 1950, was married first to Patric Craddock, divorced, and married twice more.
- dd. Patric Dale, born November 14, 1950, twin of Patricia, was married to Teresa Sampson.
- ee. Alice Ann, born May 27, 1952, was married to James Aldridge, Jr.

- d. James S., born March 25, 1928, worked for years with his father in the service station business, and was married first to Loretta Jurasch of Louisville, but later divorced.

J.S., as he is called, is more like a brother to Wavy than a son, and everyone says they are just like two peas in a pod. J.S. now owns a furniture store in Radcliff, and is married to a Korean native.

- e. Elizabeth Ann, born May 7, 1930, was married to Robert Schuble of Louisville, October 16, 1948.

Don and JoAnn lived in Louisville for a number of years, and their children were born in Kentucky. Don was uneducated, could barely read or write his name, but he could operate any kind of heavy equipment without instruction, and the machines became an extension of himself. They moved to Florida in 1976, and Don was able to get a job on construction work immediately. Soon he had his own company and could not keep

up with the work. He was about to lose the business, and his brother-in-law, George Garrett, took over. Don returned to Louisville after he and JoAnn were divorced, and he died after open-heart surgery.

Don and JoAnn were the parents of three children:

Henry David's parents gave the newlyweds five acres of land in North Carolina, and they built themselves a new house there.

JoAnn was married second to Nicholas Kelley, a mechanic for the County of Pasco, Florida, July 20, 1984.

Julian and Shann, as Rosann was called, lived on the south side of the Bee Spring-Sunfish Road, near the home of Corbet Lashley, just before going down the steep hill to Bear Creek.

In his later years Julian became senile, and he died in Hopkinsville on January 2, 1945.

Julian and Shan were the parents of three children:
