

### The Tomes Family

Although the Tomes family was not Catholic and did not really belong to the Sunfish community, I would like to include them since there were marriages between the Tomes and the Sunfish families.

Thomas Tomes, born in Virginia, parentage unknown, was with the American forces which fought the British at Kings Mountain, South Carolina on October 7, 1780. The American Army was made up of frontiersmen and suffered casualties of 300 while inflicting casualties of 1,100 on the British.

It was the custom during the Revolutionary War for men to enlist for as short a span as three months. Sometimes a man would engage in only one battle during that time, and afterward he would return home. This must have been the case with Thomas, for after Kings Mountain he started for home in Virginia, walking alone. Thomas was attacked by Indians, wounded, scalped, and left for dead. Somehow he made his way to a road where he was found by soldiers who nursed him back to health.

Thomas returned to Albermarle County, and there on July 29, 1788, his son Anderson was born. Thomas moved the family to Pulaski County, Kentucky in 1803, and it is thought he died there the same year. Anderson's mother, Sarah, whose maiden name is unknown, died in Grayson County circa 1830, and is buried at the Dan Woosley Pioneer Cemetery in Grayson County.

Anderson Tomes first appeared in the Reedy area on the Grayson County tax list for 1819. He was joined in 1823 by James Tomes, probably a brother. When Edmonson County was formed in 1825, both James and Anderson paid tax on 100 acres of land on Reedy Creek. James moved into Grayson County, and appeared on the census of Grayson County, 1850:

We have not found the marriage of James Tomes, and have no idea who his wife was, or when she died. I have not followed this family any further.

Anderson Tomes was married to Nancy, daughter of Indiman Baker and Rutha \_\_\_\_\_, in Pulaski County, December 25, 1815.

We know of but two sons which were born to Anderson and Nancy, James, born January 8, 1819, and Silas Russell, born October 22, 1822.

James, son of Anderson Tomes and Nancy Baker, was married to Elizabeth, daughter of Thomas Woosley and Phoebe (Polly) Adams, in 1837.

James and Elizabeth were the parents of two children:

Artie Mishie, born April 1, 1938.

James B., born August 20, 1840.

James Tomes died January 17, 1840, buried at the Dan Woosley Cemetery in Grayson County. Elizabeth was then married to Buford Nash.

Artie Mishie was married to Arthur Beau Nash Miller and died April 10, 1926. I have not researched this line.

James B. lived with his mother and step-father until he was about nineteen, then enlisted into the Confederate Army, 1st Tenn. Cavalry, Company "A". He fought in many skirmishes during the War and afterward returned to Edmonson County.

James B., son of James Tomes and Elizabeth Woosley, was married to Rebecca, daughter of Abraham Miller and Rachael Miller, November 29, 1866.

James B. ran a general store and farmed 200 acres. He and Rebecca were the parents of at least thirteen children.

Andrew Jackson and Mary Belle, from my earliest memory, lived on Highway 238 about one mile west of 187. The house and barn were on the north side, and the garden and two fields were on the south side of the road. At that time the road was not even graveled, and in the winter it turned into a river of mud. They had a big sweet apple tree and a mulberry tree in the back yard, and I spent a good deal of time climbing the trees for apples the size of softballs, and big juicy mulberries.

Grandpa smoked a pipe and chewed tobacco. He always had hands of tobacco hanging on a wall; I guess he got them from Uncle Charlie Wooden since no one in Sunfish grew tobacco at that time, and if he wanted a chew or a smoke he just twisted off some of the leaf. His pipe really stank up the place.

When taking care of the farm became too much for Grandpa, he sold out and moved into a house owned by Uncle John "Cap" Durbin which sat across the road from J.L. Durbin's store. John A., my first cousin

who now owns the store, and I alternated staying with Grandpa and Grandma at night. Grandpa died in 1943, and afterwards Grandma moved to the house beside Dad's store after we moved to the south side of Sunfish Creek. At one time Thomas Lashley and his wife, Sarah Ellen, Grandma's niece, stayed in the house with her. I stayed with Grandma most nights, and when I came back from milking the cows, she would have my breakfast ready. When Grandma got so she couldn't keep house any longer, she started staying with her daughters, one month at a time. She died in 1958.

#### **Children of Andrew Jackson Tomes and Mary Belle Bush**

- a. Sarah (Sally), daughter of Andrew Jackson Tomes and Mary Belle Bush, was married first to Nicholas Cabel Tilford, parentage unknown, in Edmonson County, July 6, 1904.

Nicholas Cabel Tilford was probably named for the progenitor of the Tilford family in Kentucky (see the Tilford sketch in the Bush Family Section), and probably was a son of Doctor Tilford and Julia Ann Bush. If so, Sally and Nicholas were first cousins, so the marriage was probably annulled.

Sally was married second to Eskar, son of William Lawrence and Julie K. Jones, August 10, 1909.

In the marriage book at Brownsville, Sally's name was Tomes, not Tilford.

Eskar and Sally lived at Big Reedy, where Eskar farmed and Sally, at least for a time, taught school. Aunt Sally did not live in the Church. Eskar and Sally were the parents of at least three children, and the birth records listed a fourth:

- aa. Hoyt K., son of Eskar Lawrence and Sarah Tomes, was married to Katherine Stone, parentage unknown, March 22, 1938.

Hoyt and Katherine were the parents of two sons:

Hoyt palled around with Guy Durbin, son of Ben Durbin and Julia Miller, who also lived at Big Reedy. They ran a restaurant in Elizabethtown for a while, and when they sold it and moved away I lost track of them both. Hoyt and Katherine now live at 2323 Charlestown-Jeffersonville Pike, Lot #55, Jeffersonville, Indiana.

- bb. Janell, daughter of Eskar Lawrence and Sarah Tomes, was married first to E.G. Sadler, parentage unknown, from Shrewsbury in Grayson County, September 16, 1944.

E.G. and Janell were the parents of one son, Danny Garner, April 16, 1945, stillborn. They were divorced September 13, 1950, and Janell was then married to Walter Bishop, son of Collie Roscoe Hack and Nannie White, December 16, 1950.

Bishop and Janell were the parents of two children:

Walter Ronald, born November 24, 1956.

Walter Bishop and Janell live at 626 Spring Street, Leitchfield, Kentucky.

- b. Emily, daughter of Andrew Jackson Tomes and Mary Belle Bush, was married to William Henry, son of John Thomas Logsdon and Catherine Ann Robinson, November 13, 1906. (This line will be carried in the Logsdon Family Section.)

William Henry and Emily were divorced, and Emily went to Louisville to live. She ran a boarding house there for a number of years and, according to the family, met her second husband there.

Emily was married second to Charles Wooden, parentage unknown.

Charlie and Emily were the parents of three children:

Charles Jackson, born April 21, 1927 in Grayson County.

Louella, born February 19, 1930 in Grayson County.

Imogene, born July 30, 1932 in Hart County.

Charlie and Emily lived on a farm in Hart County, and the one time my mother and I visited, we had to cross the Nolyn River three times getting to their farm from Sunfish. The last time was in the rowboat.

Jack did a lot of fishing while we were there, and caught a large eel one day. That is the only time I have ever eaten eel. Looks too much like a snake. Uncle Charlie had just finished a tobacco barn before we arrived, and there was a lot of scrap wood lying around. One day I jumped off a fence and landed on a nail sticking up through one of the scrap pieces. The nail went all the way in my foot. Sure was sore for a few days. Uncle Charlie made me some crutches from tobacco sticks, but he had to carry me back to the car for our return trip.

I have no information on the marriages of these children.

- c. Pruda Frances, daughter of Andrew Jackson Tomes and Mary Belle Bush, was married to Alexander, son of John Thomas Logsdon and Catherine Ann Robinson, April 27, 1908. (This line will be carried in the Logsdon Family Section.)

After the death of Alexander, circa 1925, Pruda Frances was married as second wife of James Presley, son of Joachim Simon and Arzella Hayes, November 24, 1928. (This line will be carried in the Simon Family Section.)

- d. Eva, daughter of Andrew Jackson Tomes and Mary Belle Bush, was married to John Allen, son of John Richard Durbin and Mary Elizabeth Durbin, in Grayson County, January 30, 1911. (This line will be carried in the John J. Durbin, Jr. Family Section.)

- e. James Orion, son of Andrew Jackson Tomes and Mary Belle Bush, was married to Rosa, daughter of Palestine Higgs and Mary Adie Basham, April 5, 1915.

Orion and Rosa were the parents of at least two children:

Adie Marie, born January 21, 1916, was married and living in Indiana before I can remember.

Virginia, birth date unknown, was reared by Andrew J. and Mary Belle. When she was 16 or 17 years old, Adie came to Sunfish, picked her up, and I haven't seen Virginia since. The last I heard, she was living in New Albany, Indiana.

Rosa was born May 17, 1897, died December 28, 1925. She is buried at St. John's in Sunfish.

James Orion was married second to Ester L., daughter of John H. Kime and Mary Ann Durbin, a divorcee, in Grayson County, June 29, 1929.

On September 24, 1932, James Orion and Ester bought a forty-acre farm near Pekin, Washington County, Indiana, from John and Clara Lewellyn for \$300.00. I believe they lived on this farm until their deaths.

At Bunker Hill Christian Church, six miles west of Henryville, Indiana on Highway #160, high on the top of a big hill, we found the graves of Orion and Ester, and three children:
